SB500 - Do the Math:

This bill requires requires early release, eliminates parole revocation and saves the state money.

Non-violent jail sentences are reduced to a 120% of minimum sentence - they're out of state prison. All others 9 months early release - they're out of state prison. Any parole violation results in just a 90 day sentence - they're into a county jail.

This law transfers state prisoners first to the community, then to a county jail for parole violations. No possibility of them returning to state prison.

So, the state is now "balancing" its budget by transferring the cost of incarceration down to the county where the parole violation incurred. Kinda like cleaning up your yard by throwing the trash over the fence into your neighbor's yard.
